

Hunting and Trapping

Area is open to hunting under statewide regulations. The following special regulations also apply.

- Only portable stands are allowed from September 1 through January 31. Unattended stands must be plainly labeled on durable material with the full name and address or Conservation number of the owner and be removed from the area by February 1st. Use of nails, screw-in steps, and any material or method that would damage the tree is prohibited.
- Trapping allowed only with special use permit. Contact area manager.



About this Area

Danville Conservation Area is in Montgomery County, southeast of the community of Danville on Highway RB. Mostly wooded, this 3,136-acre area features numerous narrow ridges between the tributaries of the Clear, Pinch, and Dishwater creeks. Limestone glades, dry limestone/dolomite woodland, and dry sandstone woodland found on the area offer unique habitat for a flora that is very similar to the traditional Ozarks south of the Missouri River. The dry glades support pale-purple coneflower, glade coneflower, prairie clovers, and Indian paintbrush among many other species. The Danville Glades Natural Area is split with 48 acres being found near the northwest corner of the area and 313 acres on the east side of the area. The north central core of the area, historically known as “The Snake Ranch” because of the purported abundance of snakes, was purchased in 1965. There is no portion of the area today where snakes are any more prevalent than any other portion of the area. However, much of the landscape could be accurately described as a type suitable for snakes. The large ridge on the east side of the area was locally known as “The Dog Farm” because fox and wolf hounds were reportedly bred and raised there in the 1920s. Additional land purchases were made in 1982 and 2014. Some portions of the area were donated to the Department while other portions were acquired through the federal Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act administered by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The area is popular with deer and turkey hunters as well as native plant enthusiasts. The unique geologic formations exposed on the area are best seen in the fall through the spring. Cedar removal and prescribed fires are frequently used to maintain the open woodland and glade communities.


Rules and Regulations

Open for public use from 4:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.;
hunting fishing, trapping, camping, dog training,
launching and landing boats allowed 24 hours a day
on areas where these activities are permitted.

- Pets are permitted but must be on a leash or confined at all time. Hunting dogs may be used off the leash and unconfined for hunting and training purposes. Hunting permit required to train dogs in pursuit of wildlife.
- Use of fireworks are prohibited.
- Nuts, berries, fruits, edible wild greens and mushrooms may be taken only for personal consumption.
- Wild greens may not be collected from the designated Natural Area.
- Digging of roots is prohibited.
- Vehicles and bicycles are only permitted on public roadways and in parking lots.
- No horseback riding opportunities except on

public roadways.

- Camping is allowed anytime in designated camping areas.
- Target shooting is prohibited.



Fishing and Boating

Fishing and frogging are permitted under statewide regulations. The following special regulations also apply.

- The ponds on this area are managed for amphibians and should not have good fishing prospects.
- On impounded waters, daily limits are six black bass, four catfish in the aggregate (channel, blue or flathead catfish) and 30 crappie. All other fish are not to exceed 20 in the aggregate. All black bass between 12 and 15 inches must be returned to the water unharmed immediately after being caught. Fish may be taken only by pole and line and not more than three poles and lines may be used by any one person.
- Seining or trapping live bait, including tadpoles, is prohibited in lakes and ponds.
